Indonesia is a close neighbour and an important partner in our bilateral, regional and global interests. A prosperous, stable and growing Indonesia is good for regional stability, security, trade and cooperation. Australia works with Indonesia to target the fundamental constraints to its growth and poverty reduction.

## Strategic direction


Australia's development assistance to Indonesia helps accelerate economic growth and stability through improving competitiveness and strengthening the impact of Indonesia's resources. Our economic partnership with Indonesia has three key objectives:

- effective economic institutions and infrastructure
- human development for a productive and healthy society
- an inclusive society through effective governance.

Our work in Indonesia contributes to achieving the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), for example by: improving the lives of poor women through increased access to jobs, social protection programs and improved conditions for overseas labour (SDG 5); improved access to water and sanitation (SDG 6); and promoting inclusive growth through increasing incomes for smallholder farmers (SDG 8).

We will offer 940 new **Australia Awards** for Indonesian students to study in Australia in 2017. In 2016-17 we had 85 **Australian Volunteers for International Development** working in Indonesia.

## Program highlights

In 2016, Australia helped:

- 88,736 farmers (40,017 women) increase their incomes
- 935,672 people (459,951 women) increase access to basic sanitation, and 536,718 people (263,238 women) increase access to safe water
- train 2,714 people (870 women) in trade policy and regulation
- 6,349 women survivors of violence receive services such as counselling
- 126,696 people (63,971 women) access social transfers, such as cash or in kind support.
