

Scope of Initiative Anti-Corruption for Development

The Anti-Corruption for Development initiative aims to increase demand for anti-corruption reforms and greater public accountability. This initiative also aims to reduce opportunities and incentives for corruption by strengthening partner country systems, oversight institutions and investigation capabilities. Whole-of-Government anti-corruption plans will be developed for Indonesia, Philippines, East Timor, Papua New Guinea and selected Pacific countries, including the Solomon Islands and Vanuatu.

The Anti-Corruption for Development initiative will invest \$16.7 million in 2007-08.

As part of this investment, AusAID plan to undertake a range of activities to address priorities identified in key partner countries or through key partner organisations. Major activities planned include:

Indonesia	Development of an Anti-Corruption Action Plan.
	 Support for public procurement and financial management reform.
	 Assistance to Indonesia's parliamentary institutions and support for civil society organisations working to increase accountability and citizens participation.
	 Support to the Indonesian government for its National Anti-Corruption Action Plan.
Philippines	Development of an Anti-Corruption Action Plan.
	 Support and training of government staff and local communities to enhance internal transparency and accountability practices.
East Timor	Development of an Anti-Corruption Action Plan.
	 Support for law and justice oversight institutions and civil society organisations working in the justice sector.
Papua New Guinea	Development of an Anti-Corruption Action Plan.
	 Strengthening audit and other oversight institutions.
	Strengthening accountability systems.
The Pacific	 Development of Anti-Corruption Action Plans for the Solomon Islands and Vanuatu Programs.
	 Support for Anti-Corruption investigation and prosecution.
Global	 Support for key global and regional anti-corruption initiatives including, the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative, implementation of the United Nations Convention Against Corruption, a regional partnership with Transparency International and support for the ADB-OECD Anti-Corruption Initiative for Asia-Pacific.
Research	 Research on the links between governance, corruption and resource industries.

The Anti-Corruption for Development initiative will support:

- a coherent Australian Government, multi-agency approach to anti-corruption;
- the implementation of positive incentives for anti-corruption;
- improved community awareness of the responsibilities of elected officials and bureaucrats and the costs of corruption; an understanding of costs of service delivery and uses of public expenditure; and
- strengthening of accountability institutions such as Offices of the Auditors General and the Ombudsman.
